

2009-2010 ARTICULATION/TRANSFER AGREEMENT
Between
The University of Memphis
And
Crichton College

The articulation agreement offers Crichton College student two pathways to degree completion upon transfer to the University of Memphis.

Pathway **one** will allow for the Crichton student to be accepted to the University of Memphis as a degree seeking student and complete all necessary requirements defined in this agreement set forth by the University as described below. Undergraduate students enrolling at the University of Memphis as a degree seeking student will fulfill course work in the following: (1) General Education, (2) College requirements, (3) Major requirements, and (4) general electives.

The Crichton College student will be accepted as a transfer student at The University of Memphis after meeting all admission requirements. Crichton College students who are transferring with 24 credit hours or more must meet one of the following admissions options:

1. Have earned an overall combined 2.00 GPA (as computed by the University of Memphis) on all transfer hours attempted.
2. **NOTE:** Students who have failed any developmental or remedial coursework will not be eligible for admission until they have completed these courses with a passing grade.
3. Have earned an associate degree in a University Parallel or University Transfer program from a regionally accredited community, junior, or senior college with an overall combined 2.00 GPA (as computed by the University of Memphis).

Students who are transferring with less than 24 credit hours of college-level coursework must satisfy the following criteria:

1. Meet the requirements of entering freshmen;
2. Have earned a 2.00 GPA (as computed by the University of Memphis) on all attempted college level as well as developmental or remedial courses; and
3. Be in good standing with the college or university previously attended.

Pathway **two** will allow for the Crichton student to be accepted to the University of Memphis as a non degree seeking [transient] student.

Transient students (those regularly enrolled and in good standing at another institution who desire to attend the University of Memphis for only a limited period of time) will apply for admissions at the non-degree level. Preferably, the transient student will have **no more than twenty four [24 hours]** of coursework needed to earn before completing the Crichton College degree. But because of the discontinuation of the Crichton College day program the University of Memphis will offer their students upper division coursework in limited programs of study to the individuals that choose this pathway.

A joint coordination will be established as set forth by this agreement between the University of Memphis' Center for Academic Transition Coordinator/Staff [Transfer Center] and with personnel from Crichton for the purpose of course registration and advising services, exclusively for students pursuing pathway two.

Transfer applicants who have been academically dismissed from the last institution they attended *but* meet the GPA requirements listed above will not be considered for admission until at least one regular semester (not to include summer sessions) has elapsed. After this period, these applicants must submit a new application (no additional fee required).

Students who meet the high school requirements, but do not have a 2.00 GPA on attempted college coursework may be considered for admission. These applicants will be reviewed by the Office of Academic Status and Retention Services. Students' major, types of courses taken, and pattern of progress, as well as high school records and standardized test scores, will be considered in the admissions process.

This agreement takes effect upon approval by representatives from Crichton College and The University of Memphis and will be reviewed annually by representatives from both institutions.

Important Crichton Notes;

1. Transfer hours without UM equivalents will be used as electives toward any Bachelors Degree.
2. The University of Memphis General Education Program consists of 41 hours of coursework from a variety of disciplines. Crichton College coursework listed above will fulfill 35 hours of General Education per the Tennessee Board of Regents. The remaining 6 hours of General Education Program requirements for the UM may be met upon transfer. Transfer students will consult with their advisor on specific General Education Program courses that may be required for the major.

² MA 2044 College Algebra is preferred to fulfill Tennessee Board of Regents requirement upon transfer. MA 1123/1223 Essentials of Mathematics I/II and MA 2034 Intermediate Algebra will NOT fulfill the mathematics requirement but can be used to fulfill remedial and developmental math.

Remaining Memphis Courses/Requirements

For all Transfer students:

1. All must have sixty hours from a 4-year institution.
2. All courses taken from an accredited institution and the GPA earned will be used at the University of Memphis for determining academic status. A transfer evaluation is used to determine which courses will be accepted for degree credit in a particular major.
3. All students are required to complete at twenty five (25%) or thirty one (31) hours of Memphis coursework.
4. All students are required to complete at least forty two (42) semester hours in upper division courses, i.e., 3000 and 4000 level.

Very brief summaries and requirements of the Academic Colleges at the University of Memphis are provided below. The academic bulletin can be viewed at www.memphis.edu with a curriculum for each major and course description.

College of Arts and Sciences

The College of Arts and Sciences accepts a maximum of two semester hours in physical activity courses toward the fulfillment of its degree requirements.

To qualify for the Bachelor of Arts degree, the student must complete a minimum of 120 semester hours with a grade point average of 2.0. Of the 120 semester hours required, not more than 42 semester hours in any one subject will be counted toward a degree. A minimum of 42 semester hours must be in courses from the upper division

College of Communication and Fine Arts

A student may earn a Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Music, or Bachelor of Arts degree, by majoring in one of the five departments that constitute the College of Communication and Fine Arts.

A minimum grade of "C" is required in every course applicable toward a major or minor.

College of Business

1. To qualify for the Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) degree, the student must complete a minimum of 120 semester hours with a minimum overall grade point average of 2.00 and meet additional grade point average requirements described below.
2. No grade below a "C" and a minimum grade point average of 2.25 (ACCT majors-2.5) is necessary in these lower division courses: MATH 1830, ISDS 2710, ECON 2110, 2120, ACCT 2010, 2020, MIS 2749, 2755. A minimum grade of "C" and a minimum grade point average of a 2.25 is necessary for these upper division courses: ACCT 3130, FIR 3410, MGMT 3110, 3510, 4710, ISDS 3510, 3711, MKTG 3010, and the International Business course.
3. B.B.A. students may apply no more than two semester hours of physical activity courses to the minimum degree requirements of 120 semester hours.
4. All courses used to satisfy specific degree requirements of this college must be taken on a "letter grade" OR "credit by examination" basis. Hours earned on a "credit/no credit" basis are accepted only in courses that are not required for the student's degree. Courses taken on an "audit" basis cannot be used to satisfy college requirements.
5. In the B.B.A. degree, the following courses are used to meet University General Education Program computation and writing intensive and integrative requirements. Credit by exam is not available for these courses:
Computation Intensive: ISDS 3711.
Writing Intensive: MGMT 3510.
Integrative: MGMT 4710.
7. A surcharge of \$20 per credit hour for 3000 and 4000 level courses and for 6000-9000 level courses has been approved by the Tennessee Board of Regents. The purpose of the surcharge on these business courses is to guarantee the continuous improvement of the college and compliance with the standards of the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business International (AACSB International).

NOTE: The Fogelman College of Business and Economics accepts a maximum of two semester hours in physical activity courses toward the fulfillment of its degree requirements.

College of Education

Students who plan to pursue an undergraduate program of studies which leads to K-12 Teacher Licensure must submit a formal application to the College of Education Teacher Education Program (TEP).

Students are encouraged to apply for admission to TEP as they enter the college. LEAD 2010, Teaching and Schools in Urban Settings, is designed to be the first professional course taken by students seeking licensure. Admission proceedings will be discussed in this course within the context of responsibility for one's own professional development, and the developmental nature of teaching knowledge, skills, and dispositions.

Prerequisites for Formal Admission to the TEP are as follows:

1. Admission application completed and returned.
2. Minimum grade of "C" in all ENGL 1010, 1020, COMM 2381, EDPR 2111, LEAD 2010, all courses in the major, and all professional education courses.
3. Satisfactory scores on the Pre-Professional Skills Test (PPST) according to the criteria established by the Tennessee State Board of Education and the College of Education, and the University of Memphis.
4. Minimum of 25 semester hours completed.
5. Overall minimum GPA of 2.5.
6. Submission of a professional portfolio prior to satisfactory completion of a personal interview.

School of Nursing

To be admitted to the School, a student must:

1. Be admitted to the University of Memphis as a degree-seeking undergraduate student.
2. Have a minimum college cumulative grade point average of 2.7, a cumulative of 2.4 in prerequisite science courses. (A prerequisite science course may be repeated only once to earn a minimum grade of “C”. A maximum of two prerequisite science courses may be repeated to earn the minimum required grade.)
3. Have completed specific pre-nursing courses with a minimum grade of “C” in all courses:
ENGL 1010 & 1020: English Composition I & II (6)
BIOL 2010/11 & 2020/2021: Anatomy & Physiology I & II (8)
BIOL 1230/1231: Microbiology (4)
SOC1 1111: Introduction to Sociology (3); or PSYC1200: General Psychology
NUTR 3202: Nutrition for Health Care preferred or NUTR 2202: Nutrition (3)
MATH 1420: Foundations of Mathematics, or Math 2000: Experiences in Mathematics, or MATH 1830: Elementary Calculus, MATH 1710 College Algebra or MATH 1190: Calculus I
4. Clearance of any high school deficiencies.
5. Have a minimum score of 600 (250 computer based score) on the TOEFL (for students for whom English is a second language).
6. Students who are transferring from another nursing program must submit a letter of good standing from the dean/director of the previous nursing program and a transcript.
7. Complete and submit School of Nursing application for admission to:

Must have complete files by the deadline (February 15 for Fall; October 1 for Spring) to be considered. (In order to allow adequate time for processing of the University of Memphis transfer credit evaluation you should receive your acceptance letter to the University by September 15 for Spring term or February 1 for Fall term).

School of Engineering

The Herff College of Engineering is organized into the Departments of Biomedical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical and Computer Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, and Engineering Technology. With the exception of Biomedical Engineering, each department offers a choice of specialized four-year programs leading to baccalaureate degrees

University College

In addition to obtaining admission to The University of Memphis, transfer students seeking admission to University College must also apply to the college. University College applications can be found at www.uc.memphis.edu/forms.htm. Students pursuing a program of study in the University College will be exempted from the American History requirement if History was taken in high school.
