Border County Tuition Plan 2010 – 2011

The Border County Tuition Plan allows qualified out-of-state students to pay tuition at the in-state rate. The plan is available to students who are residents of the following counties:

Crittenden County, Arkansas
De Soto County, Mississippi
Marshall County, Mississippi
Tate County, Mississippi
Tunica County, Mississippi

Academic criteria necessary to qualify for the border county tuition waiver are listed below. **These criteria are not used to determine admission to the University of Memphis.** These criteria are used **solely** to determine whether a student qualifies for the border county tuition waiver.

Eligibility:

Freshmen students must present a minimum ACT composite score of 20 (or SAT equivalent) AND a minimum cumulative high school GPA of 2.75.

NOTE: Transfer students with less than 24 attempted hours must meet the freshmen criteria.

NOTE: Admitted graduate students are not required to meet any additional academic criteria.

Financial Aid

FAFSA

To be eligible for financial aid, students need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible after **January 1**.

In order to receive priority consideration for programs with limited funding, the FAFSA should be mailed no later than **March 1st** so the application can be processed by April 1st.

2010-2011 Scholarship Programs

The University of Memphis awards hundreds of academic scholarships each year to entering freshmen. All scholarships are awarded for the academic year (Fall and Spring semesters only). Scholarships are awarded based on information submitted on the University of Memphis admissions application. A separate scholarship application is not required unless noted. The priority deadline for admission to The University of Memphis for scholarship consideration is **March 1.**

All University of Memphis scholarship program awards are based on a combination of ACT/SAT scores and cumulative high school grade point average (7th semester). These scholarships are four year, renewable scholarships requiring full time enrollment. Early application to The University of Memphis is strongly encouraged as scholarship awards are limited. Students eligible for the State of Tennessee HOPE Scholarship Program (Lottery Scholarship) must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as specified by the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation (TSAC). Distinguished Scholarship Programs

Cecil C. Humphreys Merit Scholarship

The Cecil C. Humphreys Merit Scholarship is awarded to all National Merit/National Achievement finalists listing The University of Memphis as their first choice with the National Merit Scholarship Corporation by the required deadline. This prestigious award is \$9,000 per year plus the following benefits:

- 1. Dell Laptop computer**
- 2. Study Abroad or National Student Exchange Stipend of \$2,000**

3. **National Merit Corporation Stipend**
4. **Assistance provided for travel to National Conference on Undergraduate Research**
5. **Non-Resident Honors Student Award (NRHSA) for out-of-state awardees.**

The Cecil C. Humphreys Presidential Scholarship

The Cecil C. Humphreys Presidential Scholarship is awarded to students with a minimum 30 ACT/1320 SAT and a 3.5 or above cumulative high school grade point average. This scholarship is also awarded to students who are named National Merit/National Achievement Semifinalists by the National Merit Corporation. The Cecil C. Humphreys Presidential Scholarship is a \$7,500 per year award. In addition, students receiving this scholarship also receive the following benefits:

1. **Study Abroad or National Student Exchange Stipend of \$1,000**
2. **Assistance provided for travel to National Conference on Undergraduate Research**
3. **Non-Resident Honors Student Award (NRHSA) for out-of-state awardees.**

The University of Memphis Provost's Scholarship

The University of Memphis Provost's Scholarship is awarded to students with a minimum 28 ACT/1240 SAT and a 3.25 or above cumulative high school grade point average. The Provost's Scholarship is awarded to a limited number of students each year. The Provost's Scholarship is a \$5,500 per year award.

The Valedictorian Scholarship

The Valedictorian Scholarship provides funding to top scholars from each of **Tennessee's accredited or state approved high schools and from the following MSA counties: Crittenden, Arkansas; Desoto, Mississippi; Marshall, Mississippi; Tate, Mississippi; and Tunica, Mississippi.** The recipient must rank number one in the class and meet the admission requirements of The University of Memphis. The Valedictorian Scholarship is a \$4,500 per year award.

The University of Memphis Dean's Scholarship

The University of Memphis Dean's Scholarship is awarded to students with a minimum 25 ACT/1130 SAT and a 3.00 or above cumulative high school grade point average. The Dean's Scholarship is awarded to a limited number of students each year. The Dean's Scholarship is a \$3,000 per year award.

The University of Memphis Advantage Scholarship

The University of Memphis Advantage Scholarship is designed to ensure the university's goal of having a diverse student body is met. This award is competitive and awarded to a limited number of students who have filed the FAFSA by **March 1.**

The Memphis Advantage Scholarship is a \$4,000 per year award. Students must be a TN resident, have a minimum 23 ACT/1060 SAT, and a 3.0 or above cumulative high school grade point average, as well as meet other criteria specified in order to be considered for this scholarship. **Completion of all financial aid documents is required for students selected to receive this scholarship.**

The Emerging Leaders Scholarship

The Emerging Leaders Scholarship **requires a separate application** available in the Office of Student Leadership (Wilder Tower, 8th Floor). **The deadline for applications for this scholarship is Feb. 1.** For more information on this scholarship, please call 901-678-8679. The Emerging Leaders Scholarship is awarded to a limited number of students each year. The Emerging Leaders Scholarship is a \$5,500 per year award. A minimum ACT of 21/SAT of 980 and a 3.0 or better cumulative high school grade point average is required for all applicants. For renewal of this scholarship, recipients must maintain a 2.75 cumulative grade point average after the first year and a 3.0 each semester thereafter. On campus housing and the purchase of a meal plan is **required** for students who are selected to receive this scholarship.

The University of Memphis Community College Transfer Scholarship

The University of Memphis Community College Transfer Scholarship **requires a separate application** available on-line at www.memphis.edu/scholarships and is also available in the Scholarship Office located in 107 Wilder Tower. To be eligible to apply, you must graduate from a Tennessee Community College, and have a minimum transfer grade point average of 3.5. Students also must apply and be admitted to The University of Memphis by March 1. The Community College Transfer Scholarship is a \$6,500 per year award. Confirmation of final transcripts with proof of degree earned is required for students selected to receive this scholarship.

The University of Memphis Phi Theta Kappa Scholarship

The University of Memphis Phi Theta Kappa Scholarship **requires a separate application** available on-line at www.memphis.edu/scholarships and is also available in the Scholarship Office located in 107 Wilder Tower. To be eligible, you must have a two year degree from a community college, and present a copy of your Phi Theta Kappa membership card or certificate along with the application for this scholarship. The Phi Theta Kappa Scholarship is \$1,000 per year award. If you are a member of Phi Theta Kappa and a member of the Phi Theta Kappa All Tennessee Academic Team, you are guaranteed to receive The University of Memphis Community College Transfer Scholarship in lieu of the Phi Theta Kappa Scholarship.

The University Transfer Scholarship

The University Transfer Scholarship requires a separate application available online at www.memphis.edu/scholarships and is also available in the Scholarship Office located in 107 Wilder Tower. The University Transfer Scholarship is provided for students who desire to transfer to the University of Memphis from another four year

institution within the first two years of their high school graduation (two years from the start of the fall term). A minimum ACT of 25/SAT of 1130, 3.5 or higher cumulative high school grade point average, and a 3.0 or higher college grade point average is required for all applicants. The University Transfer Scholarship is a \$3,000 per year award, and students must apply by July 1st for fall awards, and December 1st for spring awards.

The Non-Resident Honors Student Award (NRHSA)

The Non-Resident Honors Student Award (NRHSA) is offered by The University of Memphis Honors Program. Under authorization from the Tennessee Boards of Regents, the University of Memphis Honors Program offers thirty Non-Resident Honors Student Awards on a competitive basis each year to students at the University of Memphis. The award enables non-resident students to attend the University of Memphis while paying tuition and fees equivalent to those of in-state residents. The award is based on the belief that students who are qualified for and motivated to participate in Honors deserve special consideration, and that Honors students contribute to the academic environment of the entire University. The NRHSA requires a separate application and acceptance into the University Honors program. The Honors Program application is available at <http://honors.memphis.edu/>.

Unless otherwise noted, renewal of scholarships is based on a 2.75 cumulative grade point average in the first year and a 3.00 cumulative grade point average thereafter. In addition, to renew an academic scholarship, students must complete service hours to the university. All scholarship awards are subject to reduction based on state appropriation of scholarship funding. All scholarship awards made after the March 1 deadline are at the discretion of the Scholarship Office and not guaranteed based on the academic requirements of the scholarships. Unless otherwise noted, an eligible student may accept one of the scholarships above. All scholarships listed require full-time enrollment in order for a student to receive the award. If a student exceeds their financial aid budget, as set by the Financial Aid Office, scholarship awards will be reduced as required by law.

When Tours are Offered

Directions to the University of Memphis

East from I-40

Follow the Sam Cooper Blvd. Signs (it will split off of I-40 to the left). Continue straight on Sam Cooper Blvd. To the Highland street exit and turn left onto Highland Street (south). Stay on Highland Street until you reach Central Ave. (four stop lights). Turn left onto Central Ave. and proceed to Patterson Street (one light). Turn right onto Patterson Street and follow it until it ends at Walker Ave. Turn right and then immediately left to cross the railroad tracks onto Southern Ave. You may park anywhere in these lots. Please remember to display your visitor-parking permit on your dashboard. The Tour Center is located in room 101 of John Wilder Tower.

South from I-55

From I-55, take I-240 East. Follow I-240 East to the Getwell Road North exit (exit 20B). Follow Getwell Road until it ends at Park Ave. and turn right. Take Park Ave. to the first traffic light and turn left onto Goodlett Street. Take Goodlett Street to Southern Ave. and turn left just before the railroad tracks. Follow Southern Ave. until you see a large parking area to your left. You may park anywhere in these lots. Please remember to display your visitor-parking permit on your dashboard. The Tour Center is located in room 101 of John Wilder Tower.

North from Hwy. 51

Follow Hwy. 51 through Millington. Just south of Millington, turn left onto Paul Barrett Parkway. Follow Paul Barrett Parkway until you come to the South 204-Naval Support Activity Memphis exit. Turn right going south onto Hwy. 204, which will turn into Singleton Parkway. Continue straight on Singleton Parkway until it becomes Covington Pike. Follow Covington Pike under the I-40 bypass, at this point Covington Pike becomes Stratford Street. Follow Stratford Street until it ends at Summer Ave. and turn right. Take an immediate left at the first traffic light onto Perkins Road. Follow Perkins Road until you come to Walnut Grove Road and turn right. Take Walnut Grove Road to Goodlett Street and turn left. Follow Goodlett Street until you cross the railroad tracks, where you will make an immediate right turn onto Southern Ave. Follow Southern Ave. until you see a large parking area to your left. You may park anywhere in these lots. Please remember to display your visitor-parking permit on your dashboard. The Tour Center is located in room 101 of Wilder Tower.

West from I-55 and I-40

Take I-40 East over the Hernando DeSoto Bridge to the Danny Thomas Blvd. exit (exit 1B). Bear right onto Danny Thomas Blvd. Follow Danny Thomas Blvd. to North Parkway and turn right. Take North Parkway to East Parkway North and turn right. Continue on East Parkway until you come to Central Ave. and turn left. Follow Central Ave. through The University of Memphis campus until you reach Goodlett Street. Turn right onto Goodlett Street and follow this road until you cross a set of railroad tracks, where you will immediately turn right onto Southern Ave. Follow Southern Ave. until you see a large parking area to your left. You may park anywhere in these lots. Please remember to display your visitor-parking pass on your dashboard. The Tour Center is located in room 101 of John Wilder Tower.

Admission

Application

Application deadlines are July 1 for fall admission, December 1 for spring admission, and May 1 for summer admission. However, prospective students are strongly encouraged to apply far ahead of the final deadlines in order to be considered for scholarships, financial aid, and other academic programs.

A \$25 non-refundable application fee is required of all applicants who have not previously applied to The U of M.

Transcripts and test scores must be requested by the prospective student and forwarded by mail from the sending institution directly to Applicant Services at the above address.

Admission Requirements

Student success at the University of Memphis is strongly predicted by academic performance in high school and also linked to performance on the ACT. Therefore, an Admissions Index will be calculated for each applicant by first multiplying the cumulative high school GPA by 30 and then adding the ACT composite score. The admission of first-time freshmen is selective based on the calculated index, and also includes an evaluation of the required high school curriculum completed. In some cases, recommendations are also considered.

Applicants who wish to provide additional information regarding special talents or circumstances may do so by contacting the Office of Admissions. Applicants with diagnosed learning disabilities should contact the Director of the Office for Students with Disabilities for further information.

Special Note to Guidance Counselors

In order to make the process of admission easier for your students, Applicant Services requests a final high school transcript with the graduation date and final computed grade point average, even if a sixth or seventh semester transcript was previously sent to the U of M.

AP Scores and College Credit

Advanced Placement Scores and College Credit

The University of Memphis gives college credit for scores of 3, 4, or 5 on Advanced Placement Tests. The equivalent scores and credits change frequently throughout the year. For the most current information, please visit

Living on Campus

University Housing

Students at The University of Memphis are not required to live in the residence halls; however, we believe it is an exceptional learning experience to live on campus.

Requirements for Living in University Housing

Students must be enrolled for a minimum of six undergraduate hours to live in the residence halls. To apply for campus housing, a student must have already submitted an application for admission to the university and received his/her U-number.

Once an assignment is made, the student will receive a letter with the assignment and a due date for the \$200 rent prepayment.

Assignment Procedures

Room assignments are made on the basis of the date of receipt of the application, student's place of permanent residence, housing preference, roommate choice, and availability of accommodations.

The Department of Residence Life and Dining Services does not guarantee compliance with every roommate request; however, every effort is made to place students with compatible roommates.

Facilities

Rawls and Smith Halls are traditional women's residence halls with community baths. Mynders Hall is a women's residence hall with connected baths, and Richardson Towers North is a women's residence hall with suite baths.

South Hall and Richardson Towers South are men's residence halls with suite baths.

Student apartments and townhouses are available north of the main campus in the Carpenter Complex.

Additional Information

Refrigerators and microwaves are permitted and must have a power requirement not greater than 120 volts and a power consumption of 1.5 amperes or less for refrigerators and 5 amperes or less for microwaves. Refrigerators may have a capacity up to 4.4 cubic feet and microwave ovens up to a maximum of 800 watts of cooking power. All units must be grounded and equipped with a three-prong plug and a three-wire cord from the unit(s) to the electrical outlet.

Richardson Towers, Rawls Hall, and Mynders Hall have study-quiet floors, where quiet hours are in effect 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

Visitation hours are 12:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m., Sunday through Thursday and 12:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m., Friday and Saturday. A sign-in and sign-out procedure takes place at the front desk of each residence hall.

Basic cable-type television is connected to each resident's room at no additional charge along with high speed internet.

Laundry facilities are provided in each residence hall at no additional charge.

The Dining Dollar\$ Plan

Each full time U of M freshman and sophomore is automatically enrolled in the Dining Dollar\$ plan. Each semester (fall and spring), your student account will be automatically charged \$300 for you to use at campus dining facilities and vending machines. On the first day of classes, you will be able to use your Student ID to eat a full meal or take a coffee break.

Orientation

Description

Orientation occurs before the start of each fall semester and helps new students and parents become familiar with the University of Memphis.

A wide range of activities and various presentations occur during Orientation. The following topics are among the different topics discussed at Orientation:

Special Programs for Freshmen

Helen Hardin Honors Program

Description

Classes are small and are structured to meet the needs of the Honors students. Students have an opportunity to earn an undergraduate degree "University Honors" by completing appropriate program requirements.

As a component of earning the Honors Certificate, the Honors Forum course offers students the opportunity to actively discuss and learn about issues in higher education. Students involved in research projects have the opportunity to work independently with faculty mentors.

Honors students will have the opportunity to attend social and educational activities and host guest lecturers/speakers. They will also have the opportunity to meet with the speakers separately in a classroom forum.

Honors students will have the opportunity to learn outside of the traditional classroom setting by volunteering for numerous public service projects throughout the academic year.

Honors students have the opportunity to experience a different region of the country through participation in the National Student Exchange Program.

Acceptance

High school juniors and seniors who have a minimum of 27 ACT (1200 SAT) and a 3.5 or better high school GPA are eligible to apply for the Helen Hardin Honors Program. Provisional admission may be granted, at the discretion of the Director, to students who have a minimum 25 ACT and a 3.0 or better high school GPA.

Student Disability Services

Description

Learning Disabilities and Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder Program

Description

The LD, Autism Spectrum Disorder, AD/HD, and ASD Program at the U of M is part of Student Disability Services. This program offers support services for students diagnosed with learning disabilities, Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder, and Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Students with learning disabilities, AD/HD, and ASD are integrated into regular classes and are held to the same academic standards as other students. The Learning Disabilities Program places responsibility on students to initiate services through timely planning with staff counselors and to follow through with services once they are arranged. The program provides the following resources:

Special advising and strategic scheduling; Early registration; Semester Plan for services and accommodations; Memos to faculty concerning disability needs; Audio Books; Test accommodations/proctoring service; Permission to audio record lectures; Preferential classroom seating; Use of Assistive Computer Technology; Note takers; Procedure for foreign language substitutions; College survival skills training; Weekly monitoring and coaching; Advocacy and referral.

Acceptance

All prospective students must apply and be admitted to the University. Admissions decisions are based on academic credentials rather than on disability. Upon acceptance to the University, students with learning disabilities and/or AD/HD should register with Student Disability Services:

To receive services, students must provide a complete and recent psycho-educational evaluation. The assessment must meet the criteria outlined in the University's documentation guidelines, which are listed on the SDS website and are mailed to

counselors and psychologists upon request. In addition to the psycho-educational evaluation, students who are diagnosed with AD/HD should provide a physician's report if they have seen a physician for evaluation or treatment of AD/HD. Adequate documentation is very important because eligibility for specific services and accommodations is determined from this information. Students with ASD should meet with the LD/ADHD/ASD Coordinator to determine documentation needs.

Disability information is strictly confidential and is not released without consent of the student. Advanced planning is essential for some services.

Freshmen First Program

Description

Freshmen First Program offers new students a supportive community within the residence hall to help them achieve academic success. This program allows 100 students to live in Richardson Towers and experience a "living and learning" environment. The program's all-you-can-eat meal plan gives students access to dining services conveniently located in the residence hall.

Major components of the program include testing and placement in appropriate level courses in math, reading, composition, and study skills. Students admitted as beginning freshmen will be placed in appropriate composition, math, reading, and study skills courses based on valid ACT/SAT subscores (no more than 3 years old). Students without ACT/SAT scores will be required to take the COMPASS placement test.

Students wishing to attend Frosh Camp are required to complete an application. Registration deadlines occur in late June or early July. To request an application, contact the Office of Student Leadership:

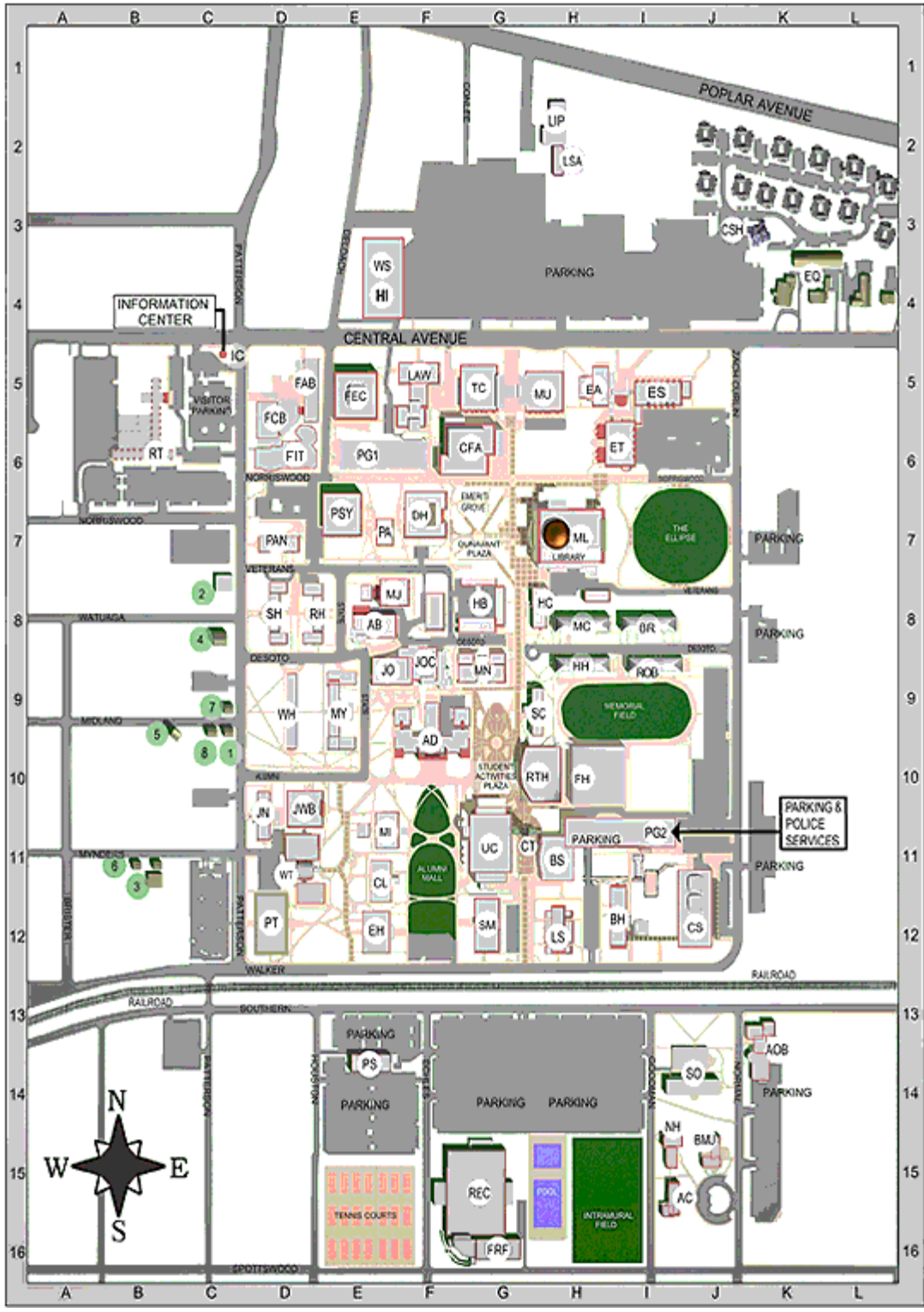
