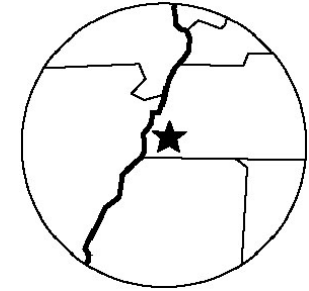
American Planning Association

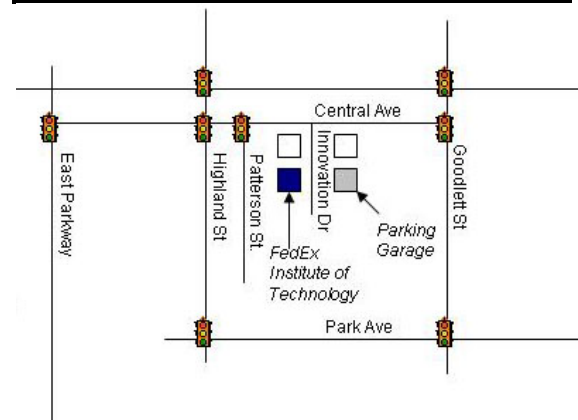
