February 27, 2004

1. **University College** – Broderick Nichols presented the proposed revisions to 120 hours for graduation in programs, with the exception of Biomedical Engineering and Health-Related Biomedical Technology to 128 hours, in University College. He also requested the UNIV 1610 and 1611 be closed out effective Summer 2004. These requests were approved.
2. **Engineering** – Charles Bray presented the proposed revisions in Engineering, noting that engineering programs are 128 hours for graduation. These requests were approved.
3. **Education** – Marty Alberg presented the proposed revisions to 120 hours for graduation in Education. These requests were approved.
4. **Communication & Fine Arts** – Laurie Snyder presented the program revisions in CFA. Architecture has reduced the hours for graduation to 128 hours. There was discussion concerning designated ART courses substituting for approved the Humanities General Education category, MUHL courses substituting for approved Humanities General Education courses for music majors, and the Humanities category is satisfied for music industry majors who meet all the B.M. requirements. These requests were approved.
5. **Business & Economics** – Carol Danehower presented the proposed revisions to 120 hours for graduation in Business and Economics. These revisions were approved.
6. **Arts & Sciences** – Will Thompson presented the proposed revisions to 120 hours for graduation in all the programs with the exception of Microbiology and Molecular Cell Sciences. The revisions, except those from MMCS, were approved. The motion to accept the MMCS proposed revisions was not approved. This proposal will be sent back to the MMCS department to revise major field requirements.

7. Other Business

- Tom Nenon announced that based on conversations between TBR and the Provost's office, either MATH 1410 and MATH 1420 will both satisfy the TBR Mathematics General Education category.
- Marjorie Luttrell reported on the deliberations taking place in the Undergraduate Curricular Task Force meetings. She said that there has been a considerable amount of discussion concerning the Writing Intensive, Computation Intensive,
