The Success Story of a Stroke Survivor

Ms. Jackson entered my therapy room April, 2012. It was almost 1 year after her stroke. She was groomed well, and articulate. She complained of problems with memory, word finding problems and fatigue. She was very motivated to find employment, because after all, she had worked all her life. Following her stroke she left her professional job as the Vice President of a human resources company.

The evaluation determined that Ms. Jackson's problems with memory and word finding were related to fatigue. It was suggested that she take rest breaks as needed. All of her communication and cognitive skills appeared to be within normal limits. She did present with the problem of blindness, but she demonstrated a determination that indicated that she was ready for the challenge.

May is National Stroke Awareness Month

What is a stroke?

A stroke or "brain attack" occurs when a blood clot blocks an artery (a blood vessel that carries blood from the heart to the body) or a blood vessel (a tube through which the blood moves through the body) breaks, interrupting blood flow to an area of the brain. When either of these things happens, brain cells begin to die and brain damage occurs.

Stroke is the fourth leading cause of death in America and a leading cause of adult disability. However, up to 80% of strokes are preventable. In 1999, the National Stroke Association Advisory Board first published guidelines to prevent a stroke.
