









Highly variegated

 While many people think of non-traditional sexualities as only gay or lesbian, there are actually a wide range of categories with most individuals not fitting into one category











Misperceptions

- Many people have a false perception that LGBTQ individuals make a conscious decision to be attracted to non-traditional partners




Lifetime Suicide Attempts for Highly Rejected LGBT Young People (One or more times)





Employment

Anti-discrimination employment laws vary widely by state depending on the inclusion of sexual orientation or gender identity, and whether the law protects those working in the public or private sector. Below are the anti-discrimination laws that protect all workers.



Housing statistics are identical to those for Employment for each state. According to Federal regulations from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), housing programs receiving federal funding are required to prohibit discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity. Barriers

- Elements of BlightBuiltenvironmentdesignedtopreventundesirable behaviors versus being designed to encourage model behavior;
- Trees located in the path of travel restricting accessibility;
- Grates not maintained creating trip hazards



Inappropriate Frontages

- Lack of transparency creates blank wall along pedestrian frontage;
- Building construction technique and material choices detract from neighborhood character;
- Many businesses located in former residential structures;
- A more cohesive "street wall" is needed to create vibrancy and sense of place



Appropriate Frontages

- Close proximity to sidewalk;
- No parking between building and sidewalk;
- High amount of transparency into buildings;
- Continuous, linear density with minimal breaks in facade;
- Multi-story buildings would add more density and define public zone better



Inappropriate Land Uses

- Uses which have been deemed inappropriate by the Unified Development Code found along Cooper include: vehicle service/sales/leasing, warehouse, and manufacturing;
- These uses lack eyes-on-the-street security and detract from the pedestrian experience



Public Art

- The neighborhood has long supported the use of public art to create a sense of place and demonstrate the strength of the community;
- Abandoned trestles and blank walls have been transformed into public art to enhance the experience of residents and visitors alike

Inappropriate Building Types

MGLCC empowers, connects, educates and advocates for the LGBT community of the Mid-South



Context: Cooper-Young

- "Prominence in a high-visited neighborhood and entertainment district" stated by survey respondent;
- An eclectic, self-described "historically hip" enclave of residences and commercial ventures;
- Hundreds of visitors from all parts of the Mid-South descend on the neighborhood during their monthly First Thursday "Night Out";
- Nearly 80,000 visitors during September's annual Cooper-Young Festival
- Neighborhood pushed for and helped develop the Midtown Overlay - a predecessor to Memphis' Unified Development Code which calls for increased density and an enhanced pedestrian experience along Cooper Street



MGLCC

- The Memphis Gay and Lesbian Community Center (MGLCC) formed its charter on 23 February 1989;
- Owns the c.1920 bungalow they are currently housed in;
- Has been approached by the owner of the adjacent bungalow (Sally's Hair Gallery) who is interested in selling to them

Non-Accessible Entry

- Is not ADA accessible;
- Small space cannot handle necessary traffic;
- Lacks air-lock;



Single Common Room

- Used for all program activities requiring constant shuffling of schedule to prevent overlap;
- Patrons express interest in home-like qualities of the space;
- Cramped space not conducive to all program activity types;
- Lacks ability for traffic to flow smoothly throughout space




Kitchen

- Requires more storage than space allows;
- Additional counter space is necessary for events;
- Primarily used as a warming kitchen for pot-luck style dinners;
- Often acts as "heart of the home" where patrons typically congregate



Office


- The center only has one office which lacks adequate storage;
- Some program activities, such as free HIV testing, must take place in office due to lack of space;
- Interest has been expressed in facility having offices for partner organizations as well



Restrooms/Storage


- Only restroom in facility is not ADA compliant;
- Centerlacks storage space often finding items stowed in "found" spaces;
- Lawn equipment must be stored inside;
- Food and clothes pantries have been relegated to the attic for lack of other space to house them


Favorite Aspect

- Intimacy




Least Favorite Aspect

- Patrons expressed a breadth of recreational activities centering mostly around the arts and literature with some reporting interests in camping/outdoors, gardening, and sports;
- Other activities mentioned: dancing, animals, yoga/meditation, cars, and music




New Features

- Meeting and event space resounded as the most needed feature for a new center;
- Theater and arts scored the lowest in terms of desirability in a new center (possibly due to proximity to the growing theater district at Cooper and Union);
- Other requests: better parking, expanded library, exercise space, childcare, revenue-generating space, and temporary housing
















The "Perfect" Woman









