- Three HAAMI members graduated from the UofM in the 2016-2017 school year!
- In Fall 2017, HAAMI membership grew from 30 to 58 members!
- Encouraging HAAMI students to study abroad by providing financial support, the Hooks Institute is launching the SAAI Initiative through a partnership with the University of Memphis Center for International Education
