Documentary on Dr. Benjamin L. Hooks Will Air Feb. 20 on WKNO-TV

Duty of the Hour, a documentary about Memphis civil rights icon Dr. Benjamin L. Hooks, will air Monday, Feb. 20, at 7 p.m. on WKNO-TV as part of its Black History Month programming.

The documentary, produced by The Benjamin L. Hooks Institute for Social Change at the University of Memphis, is the first to explore the life of Hooks, who rose from the streets of segregated Memphis to the national stage as a civil rights activist and high-level government official. His story is an exploration of this nation's long, complex and difficult history of race. How activists, politicians and the nation addressed racial, class and other tensions of the of the late 20th century, especially during the 1960s, provide insight on how we as a nation might address today's struggles involving, race, class, ethnicity, LGBTQ and other important issues of our day.
