- Start your own business! Entrepreneurship students are well-rounded with business, innovation, and venture creation skill sets.
- Join a startup company as a founder or early employee. Startups look for people with quick minds, big-picture thinking, and an entrepreneurial mindset.
- Find a "regular" job at a company that values innovators and "corporate intrapreneurs," or people that take risks, execute big ideas, and exercise vision within an existing organization.
- Secure a job that requires significant problem-solving skills, agility, adaptability, and vision such as jobs in sales, marketing, finance, technology, etc.



- With support, resources, and mentorship from faculty and the Crews Center for Entrepreneurship, entrepreneurship students have every opportunity to start their own company, consulting firm, or nonprofit organization while still pursuing coursework—ideally creating your own job by the time you graduate.
- Typical entry-level jobs are venture capital associate, consultant, business developer, franchiser, financial planner, marketing administrator, and more.
- Experienced graduates progress to jobs such as CEO, venture capitalist, executive coach, economic developer, and small business executive/owner.
- Entrepreneurship courses are excellent preparation for general management positions in all industries. Small business managers, owners, and entrepreneurs also find entrepreneurship coursework useful for innovation- and product development-oriented jobs.



General business scholarships as well as scholarships specifically for management majors are available for qualified students. A variety of internships are available for summer, one semester, or a full academic year. Strong department relationships with the UofM Crews Center for Entrepreneurship and local entrepreneurship support organizations greatly strengthen meaningful internship availability. A maximum of 3 credit hours of internship may be used in the major.
