English 3222—Victorian Literature—Fall 2015

In this course, after a look at some important Victorian cultural concerns, we will examine the great fantasy literature of the period. In addition to the poetry of Arnold, Emily Bronte, Robert Browning, Tennyson, Mary Coleridge, and Christina Rossetti, and the nonfiction of Dickens, we will examine the fiction of Carroll, Dickens, Stevenson, Haggard, Conan Doyle, Gaskell, James, Stoker, Kipling, and Wilde. Outcomes: Students will become adept in formal analysis, including scansion, and emerge with an understanding of the intellectual themes of the period—including the impact of technology and science on society, the conjunction of love and death, the nature of criminality, the attempt to understand the human mind, the position of religious belief, the discovery of other cultures, and the uses of the past-and their implications for the future. Students will also improve their writing and test-taking skills
