ENGL 4/7530 Field Experience/Practicum in ESL

Course Description: Fld Exp/Pract In ESL (3-6)

Experience in observing and teaching, peer teaching, and work with an English as a Second Language (ESL) specialist. Grades of S, U, or IP will be given.

Prerequisites: None

Text(s): : Various materials for tutoring/teaching

Support of Conceptual Framework: This course is designed for pre-service ESL teachers to develop and implement knowledge and skills associated with teaching English to speakers of other languages.

Key Assessments: Field experience and observations

Course Objectives:

- 1. Observe ESL classes for adults and/or K-12 students.
- 2. Teach/tutor ESL students in classes or individually.
- 3. Identify multiple methods of gathering relevant assessment data for instructional purposes.
- 4. Determine strengths and weaknesses in student performance based on assessments.
- 5. Select and modify materials and strategies for students with diverse needs and ability levels.
- 6. Structure lessons and classroom activities to actively involve students in learning.
- 7. Promote higher order thinking through patterns of questions and structure of learning activity.
- 8. Submit observation journals through the course site.
- 9. Submit teaching/tutoring journals through the course site.

Assignments, Exams, and Grading Criteria: Students successfully completing the practicum will receive a grade of S. Those who do not will receive a grade of U. Those who need to continue working on the practicum will receive a grade of IP.
