
"Rise, Sally, Rise"—The Black Feminist/Womanist Literary Movement ENGL 4374.M50—African American Literary Movements

This course will examine the continued development of African American Women's literature from the 1970s to the present. The decade of the 70s witnessed the rise of the Black Feminist Literary Movement that resonated with the voices of literary phenomes such as Audre Lorde, Toni Morrison, Gloria Naylor, Ntozoke Shange, and Alice Walker and prepared the path for contemporary authors Brit Bennett, Pearl Cleage, Tayari Jones, Suzan-Lori Parks, and Sister Souljah. Sharing this space with colleagues in areas of Africana, artistic, environmental, historical, legal, political, and sociological studies, these writers birthed a literary movement that established frameworks for the development of Black Feminist and Black womanist *belles lettres* that championed political and social activism, correct representation, and inclusivity.

This WEB-based course will include literary and cultural studies readings, multimedia texts (music, video, podcasts, etc.), and video/audio discussion boards as part of its design. Assignments will include written responses, mid-semester and final examinations, interactive/experiential assignments, journal responses, and a micro-teaching presentation.
