## **Course Description**

In this survey course students will be exposed to the literary offerings composed by author-artists-activists following the Harlem Renaissance. Particular emphases will be placed on the works of Chicago writers Richard Wright and Gwendolyn Brooks, integrationist aesthetics of the 1950s in works authored by Ralph Ellison, the literature of the Civil Rights and Black Arts/Black Aesthetic movements of the 1960s, and the prominence of African American female voices during the 1970s and 1980s. Students will continue to build upon their understanding of literary terminology, theories, periods, and genres. This web-based course will attempt to integrate various forms of media in order to enhance the students' understanding of the assigned texts, their authors, and each literary period.
