AIMS AND ORGANIZATION:

This course compares and contrasts the foundational myths of Western civilization with their later reincarnations in epic, novel, and film. Many detail either a sexual fall or its opposite, sexual "salvation" as in the story of Cupid and Psyche (below), which we will cover along with three other major themes dominating both ancient and modern sources:

1) *Creation and Fall* —origins in Genesis; *Theogony, Works and Days, Metamorphoses* book 1 *Modern Incarnations—Paradise Lost*, books 1-2, 4, 5-7, 9, and *Frankenstein*, part 1

- 2) The Monstrous Journey—origins in Homer's Odyssey, Metamorphoses, books 7-11. *Modern Incarnations--Paradise Lost,* book 3; Frankenstein part 2, Oh Brother Where Art Thou?
- 3) Apocalypse and Reincarnation—origins in the Book of Revelation, Metamorphosis, Book 15, "The Teachings of Pythagoras." Modern Incarnations--The Time Machine, The Road.
