Victorian Fantasy

English 7278 Short Course Description

Spring 2017

In this course, after a look at some important Victorian cultural concerns, we will examine the great fantasy literature of the period. In addition to the poetry of Arnold, Emily Bronte, Robert Browning, Tennyson, Mary Coleridge, and Christina Rossetti, and the nonfiction of Dickens and Wilde, we will examine the fiction of Carroll, Dickens, Stevenson, Haggard, Conan Doyle, Gaskell, James, Stoker, Kipling, and Wilde. Outcomes: Students will become adept in formal analysis, including scansion, and will emerge with an understanding of the intellectual themes of the period—including the impact of technology and science on society, the conjunction of love and death, the nature of criminality, the attempt to understand the human mind, the position of religious belief, the discovery of other cultures, and the uses of the past--and their implications for the future. Students will improve their oral and written presentation skills, engage in high-level research, and sharpen their test-taking skills. There will be an emphasis on writing for publication and conference presentation.
