## Popular and Literary Traditions

This course examines popular texts of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries written for adults and children that have shaped concepts of nation, narrative, childhood, and freedom. The course will take up the topic of how popular and literary codes circulated in well-known narratives can shape perspectives of nation and freedom.

Requirements: Participation (preparation, comments in discussions, engaged and civil responses in class) (100 points); responses to readings (five) (100 points); one conference length paper (200 points); two presentations (200); mid-term (100); final research paper 15-20 pages (300)
