University of Memphis Language Fair 2020

i GUIDELINES

- Participants will wear a costume interpreting an aspect of the target culture. Homemade costumes are given preference. Costumes must be appropriate to the language or culture currently studied by the student.
- The student must deliver a short explanation of the costume in English. The oral presentation should be no more than three minutes.
- On the day of the Fair, the student will sign-up for the order in which they will present at the registration tables in the Atrium of the University Center from 8:00 a.m. – 8:30 a.m. The student will also pick up a judging sheet. The student must complete the top part of the form and give it to a judge of the competition before the competition begins. The judge(s) will use the form to judge the students as they perform.
- Students present in the order following the sign-up list, unless otherwise stated by the judge(s) of the competition.
- No limits on number of entries.
- Foreign language students, native/heritage speakers, and speakers of cognate languages are welcome to participate in this event.
- If a piece of art does not have “Cultural Relevance”; then, the art is eliminated from judging.

Interpretation	The design shows unique (“outside of the box”) and creative interpretation with great attention to details.	The design shows creative interpretation with attention to details. Cultural Relevance	Represents a specific cultural aspect of a linguistic community of the target language without relying on stereotypes	Represents a general cultural aspect of a linguistic community of the target language without relying on stereotypes	Represents a cultural aspect of a linguistic community of the target language, but might rely on a stereotype	Little to no relevance to the linguistic community of the target language
Introduction	Student provides outstanding explanation of the selection within the appropriate time allotted	Student provides adequate explanation of the selection within the appropriate time allotted	Student provides a somewhat inadequate explanation of the selection and/or within the time allotted.	Student provides an inadequate explanation of the selection and/or within the time allotted.

Judges will also determine whether the **costume** has real learning value for the competitor, especially in the event of a tie.
