## i GUIDELINES

- Students will submit a project based on particular countries and/or cultures in the target language. Projects must display effort on the part of students to present research on, and an understanding of, some aspect of a targetlanguage speech community or culture.
- The following information must be visible on the project display:
- Category: RESEARCH PROJECT
- Language
- School
- Name of student(s)
- Name of teacher
- Projects should not exceed an area of 3 feet by 4 feet.
- Projects that have won prizes in previous years may not be re-submitted.
- Maximum of three (3) entries per class and three students per project.
- Second language learners, native and heritage speakers/learners, and speakers of cognate languages are welcome to participate in this event.
- Students will make a two- to three-minute presentation in the target language (except for Latin) to judges inperson on the day of the Language Fair and respond to judges' questions in the target language for a minimum of two minutes. At least one student from the group must be present at the time of presentations to the judges. Native speakers, heritage speakers/learners and speakers of cognate languages cannot participate in the presentation to judges, though they may be part of the research group. See the Language Fair program for the schedule of presentations.
- Native Speaker - the majority of formal education is in the target language
- Heritage Speaker/Learner - the majority of formal education is in English, but the target language is commonly used for communication in the home
- Second Language Learner - little or no experience with the target language outside of formal education
- Cognate languages are ones that closely related to the language being tested, such as Portuguese speakers in Spanish contests. Speakers of cognate languages are excluded from the vocabulary quiz in the name of fairness and may not participate in this event.
- All display events (Art, Crafts, Greeting Cards, Posters, and Research Projects) must be in the appropriate room (organized by language) by 8:45 a.m. on the day of the Fair. They must also be retrieved from the rooms where they are displayed by 2:00 p.m. or they will be thrown away.
