## **DANCE - WORLD**

## **University of Memphis Language Fair 2026**

## **GUIDELINES**

- This competition is for dances from all areas of the world outside Spanish-speaking regions.
- Dance groups must have a minimum of two participants.
- Maximum of three groups per class
- The time limit, including the introduction, is 10 minutes. Only one rhythm per performance.
- Participants must provide their own equipment. Speakers, pianos, etc. will not be provided.
- Dances must be appropriate to the language or culture studied and must be introduced by a short explanation as to the period, style, country, etc., delivered in English.
- The performance should be inspired by authentic variations of music, dance patterns, and dress. Costumes should correspond to the culture from which the music is derived. Again, **only one rhythm is allowed per performance**. For example, "tango" or "folk dance", but not a combined performance with multiple dance styles.
- Music selection and lyrics, costumes, and dance should be appropriate for an academic setting.
- On the day of the Fair, one student from each group will sign up for the order in which they will present at the room of the event. The student will also pick up a judging sheet at registration. The student must complete the top part of the form and give it to a judge of the competition before the competition begins. The judge(s) will use the form to judge the students as they perform.
- World language students, native/heritage speakers, and speakers of cognate languages are welcome to participate in this event.
