Application Process

Applying for admission to the University of Memphis Cecil C. Humphreys School of Law starts by visiting our website at memphis.edu/law/admissions. Applicants are encouraged to begin the application process and submit all the required documents as early as possible. We start a new class only in the Fall.

Application Opens: Sept. 15

Priority Application Deadline: March 1

Application Closes: July 15

Required Application Components:

Memphis Law Application

The application is accessed through an account at LSAC.org. Be sure to answer all questions thoroughly and accurately.

- **Personal Statement**
The personal statement provides applicants with the opportunity to describe their background and any unique experiences, characteristics or circumstances you want the admissions committee to consider.
- **Resume**
Submit a complete resume listing relevant work, volunteer, and educational experiences.
- **Admonitory Action Explanation (Required if Applicable)**
If an applicant answers “yes” to any of the Admonitory Action section questions, they must provide an addendum detailing the date and location of the event and an explanation of what occurred.

Credential Assembly Service (CAS)

The CAS simplifies the law school application process by compiling all LSAT scores, academic transcripts, and letters of recommendation into a single CAS Report.

- **Standardized Test Score**
Applicants for the next entering class must have a valid reportable LSAT or GRE score taken within the last five years. The latest test score that can be used in the review for Fall admission is the June test, but seat availability is very limited at that point in the cycle.
- **Transcripts**
Applicants must submit transcripts from all undergraduate and graduate institutions attended to the credential assembly service.
- **Letter(s) of Recommendation**
One letter of recommendation is required, and you may submit up to four letters. Recommendations should be from professors, instructors, or other professionals who can provide relevant information on your intellectual ability, academic performance, character, and potential for success in law school.

Optional Application Components:

- **Supplemental Essay**
If you feel you have additional relevant information to share that will provide the admissions committee with a more in-depth understanding of your background, interests, and goals, we encourage you to provide a supplemental essay using the prompts provided.
- **Addenda**
Addenda may speak to area(s) of the application that need further explanation, such as if you want to include information explaining a low grade point average or change in LSAT/GRE scores.
- **Scholarships**
Scholarships are primarily merit-based and there is not a separate application for consideration. Information from your application will be used to determine eligibility.
- **Financial Aid**
Applicants are encouraged to complete the application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by April 1. Memphis Law's code is 003509.
- **Tennessee Institute for Pre-Law (TIP)**
The University of Memphis School of Law operates the Tennessee Institute for Pre-Law (TIP) summer program for Tennessee residents and border-county residents from underrepresented backgrounds who are not admitted through the regular process, but who show potential for the study of law.
