Plato

Discussions of the topic are scattered throughout Plato's corpus. It would be useful to consult the Index entry for "god(s) in the recommended text, *Plato, Complete Works*, ed. John M. Cooper, p. 1769. More specifically, good preparation for writing on the topic would probably involve studying the following: *Euthyphro, Apology, Phaedrus* 245c257b, 273d-274a, 278d; *Republic*, books 2, 3, and 10; *Theatetus* 173c-177a; *Timaeus* 27c-55c, 68d-72d; *Laws*, book 10.

Aristotle

Metaphysics, books 9 and 12. (Useful but optional background reading for these books of the *Metaphysics* are *Physics*, 5. 1-2, 7.1, and 8.) *Nicomachean Ethics*, 10. 7-8. Recommended texts: *The Complete Works of Aristotle*, Volumes I-II, ed. J. Barnes.

Hellenistic Philosophers

For the Epicureans, read fragments, testimony, and commentary relevant to their cosmology, cosmogony, and theology (most important are chapters 6, 8-9, 11-15, 20-21, 23-25 in the sections on Physics and Ethics in the recommended text). For the Stoics read fragments, testimony, and commentary in the sections on Physics and Ethics in the recommended text; most important are chapters 45-46, 52-55, 60-63, 65-67.
