Murray Spindel was a great friend to the University of Memphis and to the faculty members and students in the Philosophy Department. For many years, Murray participated in philosophy courses and became actively involved in the intellectual and social life of the department.

Murray and his wife, Chris, endowed a gift to the Philosophy Department to fund an annual conference on varying philosophical topics. Over the years, they hosted many events in their home, including a BBQ dinner each Spindel Conference. On July 7, 1999, Murray died of cancer, but Chris continued the BBQ dinners for many years.

Each year, the proceedings of the conference are published as a Supplement to *The Southern Journal of Philosophy*. These Spindel Supplements represent important contributions to philosophy.
