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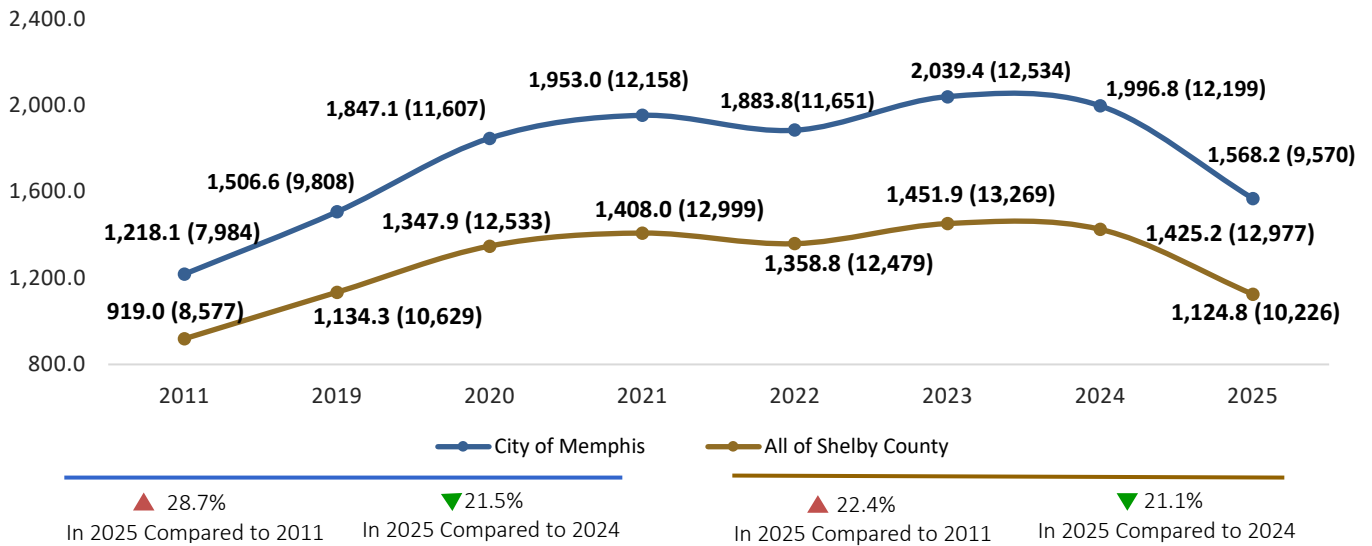
## **Reported Crime Continues to Decline Across the Board**

Based on preliminary data from the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) released by the University of Memphis Public Safety Institute and the Memphis Shelby Crime Commission, through the third quarter of this year (January – September), reported crime in Memphis and all of Shelby County continued to decline significantly in every major category compared to last year. The declines build on the declines reported in almost every major category last year.

Major violent crime includes reported murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. The rate is determined by the number per 100,000 population. In Memphis, the violent crime rate dropped a very significant 21.5 percent compared to the first three quarters of last year (9,570 offenses compared to 12,199 in 2024). That includes a 14.3 percent drop in murders (172 total murders compared to 201 in 2024), a 26.3 percent decline in reported rapes (263 compared to 357 in 2024), a decline of 20.4 percent in the rate of reported robberies (1,282 offenses compared to 1,612 in 2024), and a 21.6 percent decline in the rate of aggravated assaults (7,853 offenses compared to 10,029 in 2024).

Rate Per 100,000 Population (and Total Number of Offenses)<sup>1</sup>



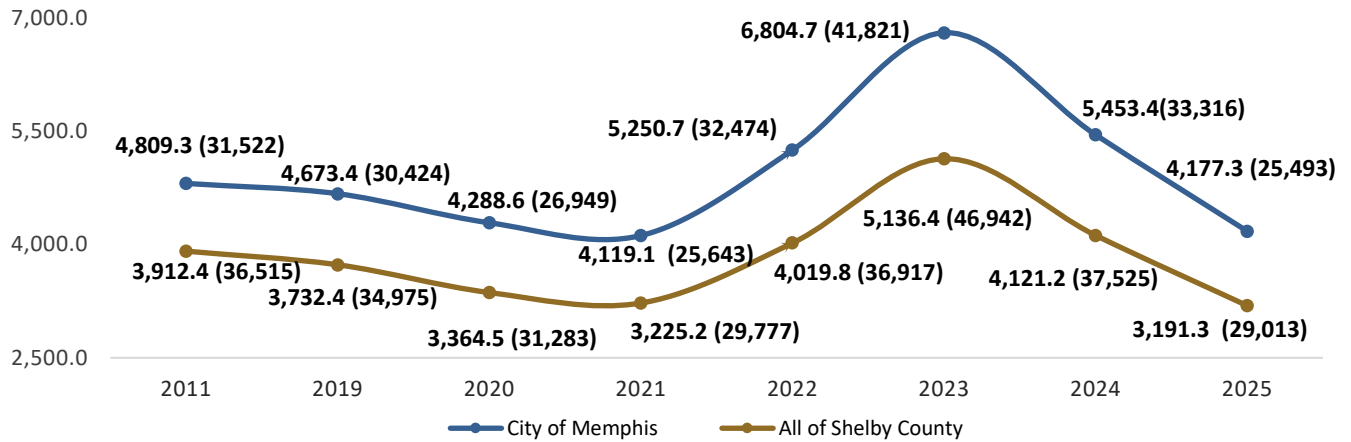

The major property crime rate includes reported burglary, vehicle theft, and other felony theft. In Memphis, the major property crime rate fell 23.4 percent compared to the first three quarters of 2024 (25,493 offenses compared to 33,316 last year). Compared to 2024, the rate of reported burglaries declined 20.3 percent (3,295 compared to 4,138 in 2024). The rate of reported vehicle thefts dropped 36.8 percent (5,019 compared to 7,947 in 2024), and other felony thefts fell by 19.0 percent (down from 21,231 in 2024 to 17,179).

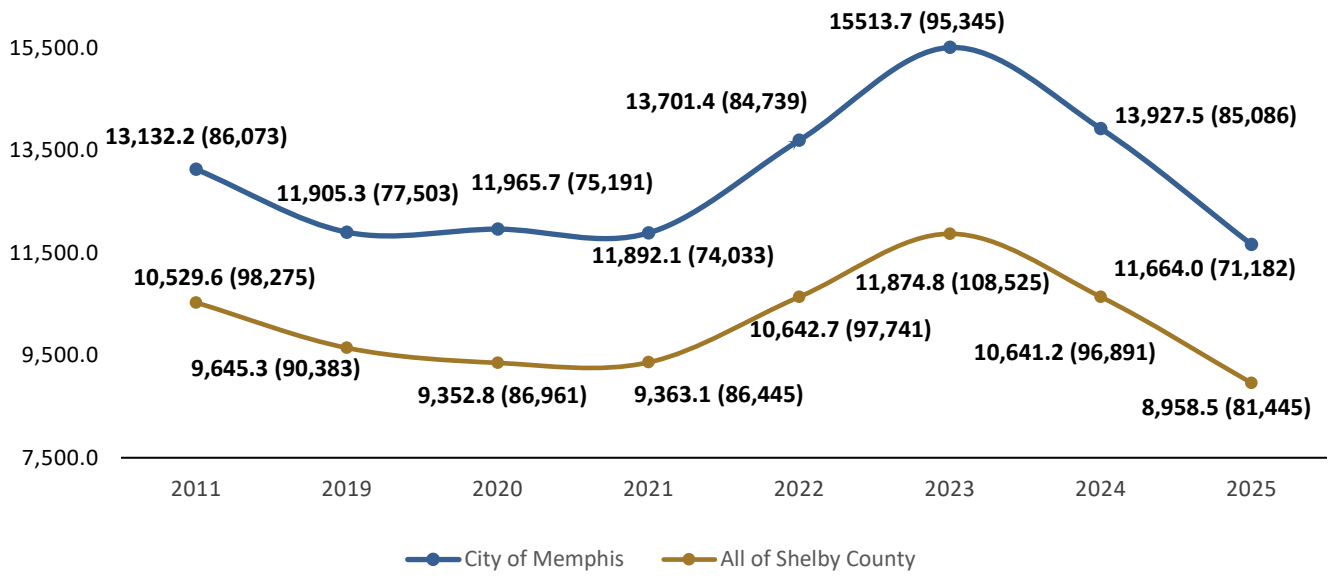

The TBI measures the overall Group A crime rate by tracking 54 separate categories (including the major violent and major property crime categories mentioned above). The overall crime rate fell 16.3 percent compared to the first three quarters of 2024 (71,182 compared to 85,086 offenses in 2024).

While the decline was not as significant as in other categories, the rate of reported domestic violence offenses fell by 3.5 percent (11,078 offenses compared to 11,492 in 2024).

As reflected in the accompanying charts and the attached tables, the declines in every major category occurred in all of Shelby County as well.

Based on the TBI data, major violent crime and major property crime began to decline in 2024, and the decline has accelerated so far in 2025. Taking the first three quarters of the two years together, the major violent crime rate has fallen 23.1 percent in Memphis compared to 2023, and the major property crime rate has dropped by 38.6 percent.

In calculating crimes, the TBI bases its data on the number of victims and offenses. For example, a reported aggravated assault involving four victims will be counted as four offenses. Likewise, an aggravated assault accompanied by a vehicle theft will be counted as two offenses. The Memphis Police Department (MPD) releases crime data based on the number of incidents rather than victims or offenses. (An exception is murder, when victims are counted.) Both methods are valid, and the trend lines are very consistent.

The Public Safety Institute and the Crime Commission use the TBI numbers in order to account for the number of crime victims and allow calculation of countywide crime rates and numbers since every law enforcement agency in Shelby County reports its data to the TBI in the same format.

“While we are not yet where we need to be in crime reduction, the declines through September of this year are very significant and reflect tremendous progress, which actually began last year,” said Bill Gibbons, executive director of the Public Safety Institute and president of the Crime Commission. “While part of it is a general nationwide post-pandemic decline, specific local steps have contributed significantly. MPD has scaled up its hot spot policing through Operation Code Zero. And the Shelby County Sheriff’s Office, MPD, and the U.S. Marshals Service have been taking the lead in serving outstanding arrest warrants for serious crimes, likely resulting in repeat serious offenders being taken off the city’s streets and out of its neighborhoods.”

**About the Crime Statistics:** In measuring crime rates and trends, the Memphis Shelby Crime Commission and the Public Safety Institute use primarily preliminary data reported by local enforcement agencies to the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS), which was developed and is maintained by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation. An incident is defined in TIBRS as “one or more offenses committed by the same offender or group of offenders acting in concert, at the same time and place.” Certain types of violent crimes and domestic violence offenses, however, uniquely refer to a victim count versus an incident count. All rates are calculated based on per 100,000 population.
