Is Memphis the Poorest City or Not? Ranking Memphis Poverty

Poverty Rates and Ranks

Poverty rates in urban areas are notorious, but poverty is as much as twice as high in the smaller rural areas as it is in the larger cities. The present report presents poverty rates for various demographic groups. Memphis has different poverty rates for different population groups and when taking into account different population sizes. Memphis' rank varies accordingly. As a result, it is difficult to answer the question whether Memphis has the highest poverty rate. The answer is, as with so many other human measures, it depends.

Utilizing the latest U.S. Census data, 2014 estimates posted in September 2015 (U.S. Census, ACS 2014 Poverty – 1Y estimates), the following tables detail poverty rates for various races and age groups. Child poverty includes all people under age 18. Tables for overall poverty rates and ranks for non-Hispanic Whites and Minorities are included, as well as poverty rates and ranks for specific minorities. Memphis is highlighted in yellow in every case.

The rank number denotes the position of a city or MSA relative to others. The higher the rank number, the higher the poverty rate for that locality. In other words, a higher ranking is not desirable. Note that there are fewer cities with more than half a million people than Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) with more than a million people. This is because MSA comprise a larger territory. As a result, Memphis is both a city with more than 500,000 people and an MSA with a population greater than one million, but not all MSA with more than 1,000,000 people include cities with more than half a million people. The tables are presented in the order of population size, starting with MSA with populations greater than a million. There are 52 MSA in this group, and Memphis ranks higher among the 52 MSA. Note that the ranking list for African American poverty among cities over 250,000 includes only 76 cities as a result of differential racial compositions among cities.

2014 Poverty Thresholds

Poverty rates are calculated by the U.S. Bureau of the Census based on poverty thresholds. The 2014 poverty thresholds are the following: for a single adult, \$12,071; for a single adult and one child, \$16,317; for one adult and two children, \$19,073; for one adult and three children, \$24,091; for two adults, \$15,853; for two adults and one child, \$19,055; for two adults and two children, \$24,008; for two adults and three children, \$28,252; for six people, \$32,473; for seven people, \$36,927; and for eight people, \$40,968.
