

Conditional Tense-Zero conditional

Zero conditional sentences express general truths—situations in which one thing always causes another.

When people smoke cigarettes, their health suffers.

Use the zero conditional (simple present + simple present) only when a certain result is guaranteed. If the result is likely, use the first conditional (simple present + simple future).

Conditional Tense-First Conditional

First conditional sentences are used to express situations in which the outcome is likely (but not guaranteed) to happen in the future.

If you set your mind to a goal, you will achieve it.
