Over the years, Rebecca held various jobs that offered tuition assistance, but these programs required students to pay tuition upfront and receive reimbursement only after successful course completion. For someone juggling bills and living expenses, this was an impossible hurdle.

Moreover, she did not qualify for grants, only student loans, a risk she was unwilling to take given her prior debt experience. The harsh reality of the job market meant she had to work three times as hard to compete with colleagues who held degrees, often being passed over for promotions despite her experience and dedication.

Rebecca's path to higher education was anything but straightforward. After graduating high school in 1993, she found herself burdened with \$20,000 in medical debt following emergency surgery, a consequence of losing health insurance on her 18th birthday due to laws at the time. Suddenly, the financial stability she had hoped for vanished, and with it, her immediate plans for college.

Forced to work full-time to pay off her debts and cover living expenses, Rebecca believed the dream of earning a degree had slipped away for good.

Yet, despite these setbacks, Rebecca never let go of her dream. In 2019, everything changed when she discovered the University of Memphis Global Life program. This innovative initiative allows students to defer tuition payments until after completing their courses, requiring only the cost of books upfront. Students must maintain at least a C grade to remain eligible, but this opportunity offered Rebecca a second chance to realize her academic ambitions without the crippling financial burden she had feared for so long.

Returning to the academic world after 26 years was no small feat. Rebecca faced challenges that extended beyond balancing work and life. Her high school no longer existed in the system, making transcript retrieval difficult. Placement tests in math, reading, and writing tested her knowledge of concepts she hadn't revisited in decades; allgebra, literary devices, and more. But with determination and steady perseverance, she made it work. She completed the necessary foundation courses and committed herself fully to her studies, driven not only by career advancement but by a genuine love for learning and personal growth.
