

Students in the Italian program can participate in a summer program at the historic University of Bologna—one of Europe's oldest universities. The program includes courses in Italian language and culture, cultural activities in Bologna, and excursions to Florence, Venice, Ravenna, Parma, Ferrara, and an overnight stay in Rome. Its central location in Emilia-Romagna makes it an ideal base for exploring Italy's artistic and cultural heritage.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

General Education (41 hours)

Complete university-wide Gen Ed requirements.

College & BA Requirements (6–9 hours)

Additional coursework as required by the College of Arts & Sciences. If you have prior academic or lived experience with Italian, contact us at cgaudenz@memphis.edu for testing options.

Major Requirements (24–33 hours)

Choose one of the following concentrations:

- Single Language (Italian only): 24 upper-division hours
- Two Languages: 27 upper-division hours (min. 9 hours per language)
- Three Languages: 33 upper-division hours (min. 12 hours in two languages + coursework in third)
- Electives as needed to reach 120 total credit hours.

Minor in Italian (18 hours)

For the Minor in Italian, students must take ITAL 1020, 2010, 2020 as well as 3 upper-division courses (9 hours).

Minor in Italian Studies (18 hours)

For the Minor in Italian Studies, students must take:

- Core: 9 hours of ITAL-prefix courses
- Electives: 9 hours from approved list of courses in English with an Italian component
