Course Description / Objective:

This course is a continuation of KORE 1020 Elementary Korean II. It is designed to further expand students' knowledge of the fundamental grammatical structure of Korean and acquire wide vocabulary used in daily-life situations. In particular, students are expected to acquire the following skills;

- (1) Ability to read Korean sentences more naturally.
- (2) Ability to maintain and develop simple conversations in Korean.
- (3) Ability to comprehend and initiate simple conversations in Korean.
- (4) Ability to write a short essay on a topic.
- (5) Knowledge of Korea about cultural practices, politics, history and etc.

- Dictation (5%): Dictation will be given at the beginning of every class unless noted otherwise.
- Short essay (10%): Students will write an essay about any topic related to chapters (e.g. school life, family, friends, etc.). Detailed guidelines will be given.
- Test 1,2,3 (Each test is 10%): The test is given after finishing each chapter.

- **Oral Test (15%)**: Students will create and perform a skit with his/her partner using words and phrase we will learn through the semester. Check the calendar for the date. Additional guidelines will be provided in advance.
- Final exam (20%): The final exam in this course is cumulative, incorporating all chapters, grammar, and vocabulary from the entire semester. The final exam will contain a written as well as listening section.
