A NOTE ON OUR METHODOLOGY: Spanish 1010, 1020, 2010 and 2020 are taught in a **blended format**, that is, we will use a combination of face-to-face and computer-mediated instruction. Also, we will use a model called "**flipped classroom**"; in a flipped classroom, students work on the material before coming to class and class time is used to practice the material learned at home. Additionally, our **target language policy** expects both teachers and students to use 80% Spanish in 1010 /1020 and 90% Spanish in 2010/2020.

What does this mean for you? This means that: (i) you are required to complete your online assignments on your own and spend a significant amount of time each week doing so; (ii) you have to come to class prepared to practice what you studied at home (Do **NOT** rely on your teacher to go over grammar and vocabulary in class; instead your teacher will help you use/practice the assigned grammar and vocabulary in context through written or oral communicative activities); (iii) you need to use Spanish to communicate with your teacher and classmates during the semester.

Understanding this methodology is key to succeed in this course!

COURSE DESCRIPTION

1020 Elementary Spanish II is designed to further develop skills for speaking, listening, reading, and writing Spanish at the elementary level. Special emphasis will be given to pronunciation, vocabulary, grammar and cultural awareness.

OBJECTIVES:

Spanish 1020 covers Lessons 6-10 of VISTAS. The objective of the course takes into account the **novice-mid proficiency level** (adapted from ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines):

- **Novice Mid Speakers** communicate minimally by using a number of isolated words and memorized phrases limited by the particular context in which the language has been learned.
- Novice Mid Writers can reproduce from memory a modest number of words and phrases in context. They can
 supply limited information on simple forms and documents, and other basic biographical information. They
 exhibit a high degree of accuracy when writing on well-practiced, familiar topics using limited formulaic language.
- Novice Mid Listeners can recognize and begin to understand a number of high-frequency, highly contextualized
 words and phrases including aural cognates and borrowed words. Typically, they understand little more than one
 phrase at a time, and repetition may be required.
- **Novice Mid Readers** can identify a number of highly contextualized words and phrases including cognates and borrowed words but rarely understand material that exceeds a single phrase. Rereading is often required.

Course Core Goals. By the end of the course, the students should develop:

- Ability to comprehend and respond to elementary level conversational patterns
- Proficiency and knowledge of elementary level grammatical structures and terminologies
- Elementary level proficiency in reading and writing the language
- Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events from the Spanish-speaking world

Participation - PAC (6%):

Participation/Attendance/Courtesy. There will be a participation check three times throughout the semester. Below are the elements that will constitute that grade:

- PARTICIPATION means that you will actively contribute to class and group discussions both by asking and by
 answering questions; it also means that you will willingly engage in class activities and that you will use the
 language of the course always, i.e., Spanish.
- ATTENDANCE. Absence from class, being late to class, early departures, and regularly entering and leaving the room while class is in session will affect your grade. Read the "Class Procedures and Policies" section to check the attendance policy.
- COURTESY. Please recognize that phones, food, and gum in the classroom interfere with course goals and are therefore not permitted. Cellular phones, and computers are permitted only to access class materials. Use of these devices during class for other purposes will be considered "disruptive behavior." Please respect the cultural and linguistic diversity of the class; understand that listening attentively and participating enthusiastically manifests respect for your classmates, for your professor, and for the learning experience.

Syllabus and Review Quizzes (1%)

You will need to complete the Syllabus Quiz and Review Quiz on eCourseware during the first two weeks of class; check eCourseware for due date. The objective of the Syllabus Quiz is to ensure that you have read the syllabus and are aware of important deadlines, class policies etc. The objective of the Review Quiz is to gauge how prepared you are for this course and what material you have mastered from SPAN 1010.

Homework (12% - 4% pre-lesson assignments + 8% post-lesson assignments)

Purchasing the aforementioned Supersite passcode is <u>necessary</u> for completing homework. **The activities are online** and assignments will <u>need to be completed by the deadlines through VISTAS</u>. Homework will be assigned at the beginning of the semester for the entirety of the semester. Homework is <u>extremely important</u> as it gives you individual practice and reinforces the exercises we do together in class. The homework is divided into two components: there will be pre-lesson assignments due **before each lesson in class (4%)** and post-lesson assignments due **after each lesson (8%)**. **Late work, completed after the deadline, will not receive full credit.** Pre-lesson assignments <u>cannot be made up</u>, and overdue post-lesson assignments will receive 50% credit.

3 Quizzes (12%)

Quizzes are an essential part of the class. There will be three quizzes (Chapter 6, Chapter 8, and Chapter 10). Please consult the syllabus for exact dates for when these will be completed. Quizzes will cover current chapter materials.

2 Exams (30%)

There will be two exams each worth 15% of the final grade. Exam I will cover Chapters 6 and 7 and Exam II will cover Chapters 8 and 9. Exams are designed with the assumption that all previously studied material will be utilized as needed. Students can expect exams to include: listening comprehension, reading comprehension, vocabulary and grammar activities, and a short composition.

Comprehensive Final Exam (20%)

This course has a final exam that will be given during exam week. Please arrange your schedule accordingly. The exam will be cumulative covering Chapters 6-10. More information will be provided well before the exam.

Oral Interview (10%)

Students will be assigned to a small group of two to three classmates near the end of the semester. Students will be interviewed using the list of questions given in class. You will find the questions and rubric on eCourseware.

Role Play Presentation (9%)

Students will complete the assignment in pairs or individually. Using the information and the guidelines given in class, students will present their project **in Spanish** to the class. <u>You will find the guidelines and rubric on eCourseware.</u>

CLASS POLICIES

Attendance and Tardiness Policy

Daily attendance is compulsory and will be recorded (including the first day of class). To allow for unforeseen circumstances students are allowed a number of absences based on how many days per week the class meets:

- 6 absences for classes that meet 3 days per week (MWF)
- 4 absences for classes that meet 2 days per week (MW, TTH)
- 2 absences for classes that meet 1 day per week

If a student exceeds the permitted absences, there will be a reduction of the student's grade.

NOTE: Every 3 times you come late to class or leave early counts as 1 absence.

Missed Assessment Approval

If an emergency prevents you from taking an assessment (quiz, exam, etc.), you <u>must</u> complete the **MISSED ASSESSMENT APPROVAL FORM** with valid <u>written documentation</u> to justify your absence including all required information. Examples of valid written documentation include: an official doctor's note, an official court citation, a published funeral notice, or an official police report. **These documents must state clearly that you were unable to attend class the day of the assessment.** Non-acceptable documentation includes: attendance to a wedding or other social event, travel arrangements, employer-related requirements, a drug prescription, a routine doctor's appointment. If you miss an assessment without completing the **MISSED ASSESSMENT APPROVAL FORM** with valid <u>written documentation</u> to justify your absence, then you will receive a 0 for the missed assessment. Be sure that your schedule does not conflict with your course exams!

Excused Absences for University Extracurricular Activities: Students participating in an officially sanctioned, scheduled University extracurricular activity will be given the opportunity to make up class assignments or other graded assignments missed as a result of their participation. Students can complete **ONE** activity per semester that will count as extra credit. Students will be required to provide proof of attendance. Extra credit will be 5 points added to Exam 2.  Schedules for these organizations will be given as at the appropriate time. Your instructor will provide more
 details.
- The Hispanic Film Festival, in which we play original films in Spanish with English subtitles. It takes place every Fall.
- The Language Fair, which is a language competition among high school students. It takes place every Spring.

<u>DO NOT ask your instructor for any other extra credit opportunities</u>. These are the only activities approved for Spanish 1020. Extra credit is added to Exam 2.
